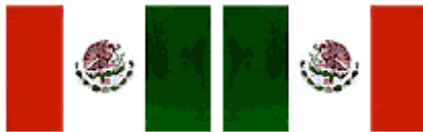

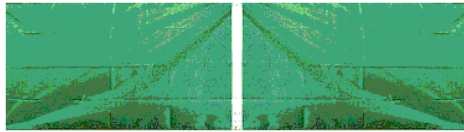
Texas Third Republic (Lone Star) 1846 - Present

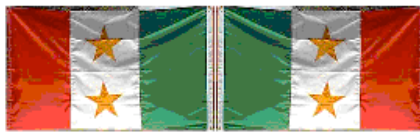

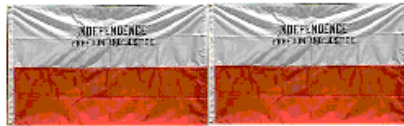

Atlatl Demonstration Plans

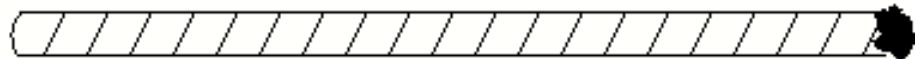
Stage 1- Have students “throw” an unmodified drinking straw. To throw the “dart”, it should be held between thumb and forefinger and gently thrown as if it were a dart.

This will demonstrate the lack of aerodynamics of a simple shafted weapon.



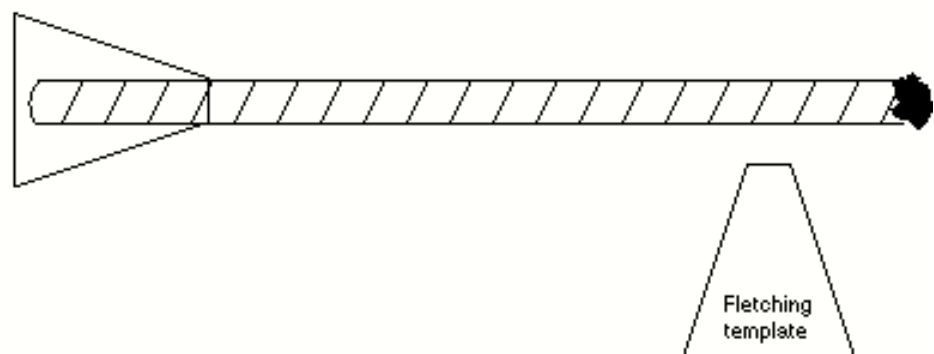
Stage 2- Have students modify a drinking straw by adding a clay “point” tip. (The “point” should be no more than a small plug in the end of the straw) students should then “throw” the dart in the same way as before.

This will demonstrate an improvement in the aerodynamics of the simple, shafted weapon.



Stage 3- Have students further modify the straw by adding “fletching” or feathers as would be found on an arrow. Use the template found below and an index card. Make a one inch notch in the back end of the straw. Insert the “fletching” into this slit. The students should then “throw” the dart in the same way as before.

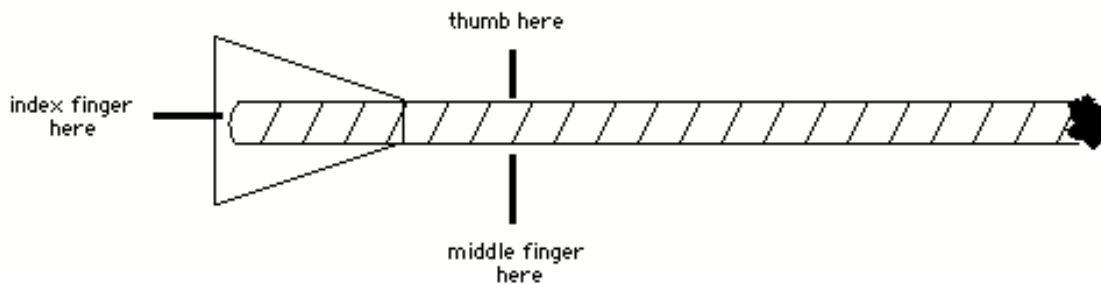
This will demonstrate further improvement in the aerodynamics of the simple, shafted weapon.



Atlatl Demonstration Plans

Stage 4 Have students now change their method of launching the dart. When they were previously using a simple “dart throw”, they should now throw the dart by holding the dart between thumb and middle finger with the index finger placed on the “tail” of the dart. Throw this dart using a football type throw. At the point of release, the index finger should do the most work and be used as a lever just as the Atlatl would.

This will demonstrate further improvement in the aerodynamics of the simple tipped, shafted thrown weapon.

Basic Social Rules for Gentlemen

A GENTLEMAN ALWAYS:

Wears gloves on the street, in church & other formal occasions, except when eating or drinking.

White or cream colored gloves for evening

Gray or other darker colors for day wear

Stands up when a lady enters a room (or his presence in a large room)

Stands up when a lady stands

Offers a lady his seat if no others are available

Assists a lady with her chair when she sits down or stands, especially when at a table of when the chairs are small and light

Retrieves dropped items for a lady

Opens doors for a lady

Helps a lady with her coat, cloak, shawl, etc.

Offers to bring a lady refreshments if they are available

Offers his arm to escort a lady (with whom he is acquainted) into or out of a building or a room at all social events, and whenever walking on uneven ground.

Removes his hat when entering a building

Lifts his hat to a lady when she greets him in public (Merely touching the brim or a slight "tip" of the hat is very rude)

A GENTLEMAN NEVER

Refers to another person by their first name in public

Curses or discusses "impolite" subjects when ladies are present

Leaves a lady he knows unattended, except with permission

Uses tobacco in any form when a lady is present

Greets a lady in public unless she acknowledges him first (See "ALWAYS #12)

Eats or drinks while wearing gloves.

Basic Social Rules for Ladies

A LADY ALWAYS:

Graciously accepts gentlemanly offers of assistance

Wears gloves on the street, at church & other formal occasions, except when eating or drinking

A LADY NEVER:

Refers to another adult by his or her first name in public

Grabs her hoops or lifts her skirts higher than is absolutely necessary to go up stairs

Lifts her skirts up onto a chair or stool, etc.

Sit with her legs crossed (except at the ankles if necessary for comfort or habit)

Lifts her skirts up onto the seat of her chair when sitting down (Wait for, or if necessary, ask for assistance when sitting down at a table or on a small light chair)

Speaks in a loud, coarse voice
