Why Advanced Academics?

GPA:

Advanced courses add points to a student's **Semester Average**. This plays a large role when calculating the **GPA** of these courses.





Advanced courses are FREE to our students. In college, students have to pay for these courses. They can be extremely costly and can range from 100's to 1000's of \$\$\$!!!

What is AP?



AP Courses expose student to college rigor, and allow them to earn college credit by passing an AP exam (score 3 or higher)






Students sign up for courses in the Spring through their counselors

What is Dual Credit?



Dual Credit allows students to earn both high school and college credit simultaneously at their high school.



College credit is awarded as long as the student earns a 70 or higher each semester.



Awarding of college credit comes from a local community college (Northwest Vista College).



Can take up to 14 courses however, if the student exceeds 30 college credit hours of dual credit, it may affect financial aid

*Complete GoFAAR & Test Prep Modules in ACES *Complete Parent Consent Form



Step 3

*Pay for and take the TSI (unless PSAT exempt)



Step 4

*Complete Dual Orientation Module in ACES- Canvas



Step 5

*Confirm Course Requests with Counselors

TSI TESTING and Waivers:

Requirement that determines eligibility to take college level courses.

TSI Test

Cost: \$14

Retest: \$14 (You must have taken the entire test prior to retesting, you can then take just the areas you need)

Administered at Sotomayor HS on April 5 and April 12 TSI Prep will be hosted at Sotomayor HS on April 10

Already in Dual Credit?



If your student is CURRENTLY taking a dual credit course (this does not include if they took one in the past, but not this year) they will do the following:

- Complete the dual credit form letting me know what courses they want to take next year (this will be emailed at the start of February to their instructors)
- Potentially sign up and take the TSI in areas they may not have previously passed or were not required to take last year.



Advanced Expectations

- It is the student's responsibility to know all important deadline dates when applying for the DC program.
- These are college level courses
- They will be considered a college student!
- Advanced classes are more demanding and the expectations are higher.
- Students should be prepared and willing to work hard to meet the challenges of their advanced level courses.



Dual Credit Transcripts

A college transcript is a permanent educational record

- Grades earned will factor into your college GPA as well as your high school GPA.
- A semester grade below a 70 will be recorded on your high school and college transcript. You will be dropped from the dual credit course and will <u>not</u> be allowed to retake that course again through the Dual Credit Program or participate in any course where the failing course was a prerequisite.
- You must send these NVC transcripts showing prior college work when you apply to any college institution



Dual Credit Withdrawals


- A student may withdraw from a dual course to avoid a failing grade; however it must be done in a timely manner
 - Withdrawal from course before census date (10–12 days into the semester): NO penalty on students NVC transcript
 - Any withdrawal after census date but before last official final day of the course will results in a grade of a W on the students NVC transcript
- A grade of W has no academic consequences in terms of GPA; however, students who earn a grade of W in their college career my find their financial aid jeopardized
- After the official day to withdraw has passed, then a student may NOT withdraw, and they earn
 the grade the instructor gives, even if that grade is a D or F



Note!

It is recommended that students check with their intended university to verify the credits will transfer.

What's the Difference?	Dual Credit	Advanced Placement (AP)	UT OnRamps
# of Courses	Max of 14 dual credit courses, recommend do not exceed 30 college hours to avoid affecting financial aid and students do not exceed 3 Dual courses a year (15 hours/semester)	There are no limits as to how many courses a student can take. Credit Transfer	College credit is transferable to other universities/colleges. Students should consult with their chosen college/university to inquire about transferability. College credit is transferable to other universities/colleges. Students should consult with their chosen college/university to inquire about transferability.
