# Superintendent's Report Dr. John Craft reported to the Board:

- **Team Northside spirit stick.** The Spirit Stick from Convocations has made its way around the district keeping the Northside spirit alive. So far, recipients have included the Fine Arts Department, Maintenance & Facilities, Reed Elementary, Marshall HS/Marshall Law and Magnet Services, and Tomlinson ES.
- Higher Education Partners. Dr. Craft met with Dr. Salvador Ochoa, the new president of Texas A&M University/San Antonio, which is the fastest-growing University in the A&M System currently. The University made a significant announcement of expanding upon the Achiever Promise program, which covered the top 10% of high school seniors. The new Jaguar Promise casts a wider net to serve even more students across the state. Eligibility requirements have expanded to include the top 11% to 35% of seniors graduating from a Texas high school with a family-adjusted gross income of \$70,000 or less; students graduating from an Early College High School with at least 30 credit hours; and transfer students with an associate degree or 60 credit hours who have a family-adjusted gross income of \$70,000 or less. Dr. Craft also met with Dr. Amy Bosley, the new President of Northwest Vista College. They had a great conversation regarding the dual credit program and ways to potentially grow a partnership, programming, and expand opportunities for NISD students in the future. He plans to meet with UTSA leadership in the future.
- **Northside Leadership Academy.** Dr. Craft reported that the Northside Leadership Academy had its second meeting of the year and commended the Leadership development team for their hard work.
- CAST Teach Pinning Ceremony. Dr. Craft, CAST Teach HS Principal Ericka Olivarez, and Executive Director of CAST Schools Jeanne Russell participated in the pinning ceremony of the incoming freshmen and sophomores (and future educators) at CAST Teach HS.
- **KSAT Conversation on Vaping.** The District continues to push education and awareness to students and parents on the adverse effects of vaping. Dr. Craft recently participated in a conversation with KSAT on this topic.
- PTA Delegate Meeting/Kick-Off. It was a packed Northside Activity Center for the first meeting with the NISD PTA Council.
- Colonies North building improvements. The Colonies North Elementary School campus improvements, originally included in the 2022 Bond Proposal which the community graciously approved, included the first phase of facility improvements. The original scope of work is being amended to address structural deficiencies. As a result, Dr. Craft met the staff and Citizen Bond Advisory Committee to present the revised plan.
- Region 20 Safety Audits. School safety audits will continue this school year and will be conducted by the Education Service Center, Region 20.
- Raise Your Hand Texas Event. Several local lawmakers were recognized by Raise Your Hand Texas (RYHT) at an
  event hosted at CAST Teach HS. Honored by the RYHT group were State Senator José Menéndez, and State
  Representatives Trey Martinez-Fisher and Josey Garcia. The group also had the opportunity to tour the District's
  newest high school magnet program.

- Trustees sign Declaration of Respect. On Oct. 6, all NISD students and staff will be invited to sign a Declaration of
  Respect as part of the District's anti-bullying initiatives. Counselors have been equipped with training, materials, and
  lessons for classroom presentations that teach necessary skills to students to promote a safe, respectful, and healthy
  school climate. Members of the Board of Trustees signed their own Declaration of Respect, as a show of support for
  the program spearheaded by the NISD Counseling Department led by Mary Libby. Dr. Craft signed on behalf of
  NISD staff.

#### Attendance zone reviewed for newest elementary school

Trustees heard the administrative boundary proposal for "Village at WestPointe West Area" Elementary School and a boundary adjustment prior to the School Boundary Advisory Committee (SBAC) meeting and the Public Hearing on Oct. 25. The SBAC, assisted by staff, will review the staff proposal, study relevant data, conduct a public hearing, analyze information as required by policy, and make formal recommendations to the Board concerning attendance zones. Elementary schools involved in the proposal are **Cole** and **Galm** elementary schools. "Village at WestPointe West Area" ES will open in August 2024 and is funded by School Bond 2022.

# **Board hears report regarding One Pass Select**

The Board considered a proposal from the Benefits Department about One Pass Select, a subscription-based fitness and well-being program that supports a healthier lifestyle. Employees can have access to thousands of gyms and online classes with flexible fitness options, a grocery delivery subscription, etc.

### Trustees hear 24-month ESSER update

It is a requirement to provide an update to the Board of Trustees at six-month intervals regarding the use of Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds. The evening's presentation represented a 24-month update.

# **Good Cause Exception Resolution**

Citing a lack of qualified personnel and lack of revenue, the Board approved a resolution claiming a good cause exemption to recent legislation requiring at least one armed security officer at each district campus. The Board recently approved adding 20 commissioned peace officers to the District's police dept. but assert that at least 75 officers would need to be added to meet the state's requirement.

# Board discusses longevity pay for police officers

The Board approved a proposal from Administration to offer longevity pay and stipends to NISD police officers who have licensing from TCOLE as a recruitment and retention strategy.

## Naming of newest elementary school

Trustees voted to name the District's 83<sup>rd</sup> elementary school for former NISD Trustee M'Lissa M. Chumbley. Chumbley, a graduate of Marshall High School, served on the NISD Board for 28 years. She continues to be a lifelong volunteer and advocate for public education. The school, formerly referred to as "Village at WestPointe West Area" ES, will open in August 2024.
