





Safety Initiatives for 2023-2024


Routine Door Checks: District maintenance staff routinely check all exterior and classroom doors and hardware to ensure they are functioning properly.



Implementation of SRP Language:

Standard Response Protocol provides common language with local law enforcement agencies in the event of a potential threat.

Mental Health Support: All NISD campuses are staffed with certified school counselors trained to support the mental health needs of students. NISD also offers specialized mental health services for students needing a higher level of support.



Enumeration of Exterior Doors:

All exterior doors on campuses will be numbered for quick reference in an emergency situation.



Mandatory Student ID Use at All High Schools:

All NISD high school students will be required to wear student IDs.

Additional NISD Police Officers: The NISD Police Dept. is adding additional officers to its current 100-officer police force. All NISD officers are fully commissioned by the state, adhere to all recertification requirements, and engage in specialized training for their work with children.



Silent Panic Alert Technology:

All NISD campuses will be equipped with silent panic alert technology that notifies law enforcement of a potential threat to the campus.

IN PROGRESS - NISD is researching options for additional safety measures including bullet-resistant film on exterior windows and doors, the use of vape sensors and metal detectors at select locations, and the addition of audible alarms on all campus exterior doors.




Texas' record-breaking surplus is now nearly \$33 billion

And Texas will have \$188.2 billion in general revenue for the 2024-2025 fiscal year, a 26% increase from the last biennium.








Legislative update and forecast



Out of 8,346 bills filed in the 88th regular legislative session, 1,294 were related to public education!





Legislative Update and Forecast

After the regular and 4 Special Legislative sessions of 2023 (246 days!), the Texas legislature did **NOT** pass bills to:

- Increase teacher and staff pay
- Increase the Basic Allotment
- Fully fund Special Education
- Fully fund School Safety mandates previously ordered
- Implement recommendations from the Teacher Vacancy Task Force
